Meeting Minutes

The Copano Bay Watershed Stakeholder meeting began with a welcome and introductions by Allen Berthold as well as brief overview of what was going to be discussed at the meeting. Allen then proceeded to give a presentation where an overview of topics discussed to date, the reasons that stakeholder structure is important and how it encourages involvement, what the preferred stakeholder framework was from the last meeting, what the roles of each group (full stakeholder group, coordination committee, and workgroups) were, and the specific roles of each of the workgroups (agricultural and wildlife, wastewater, technical advisory, and education and outreach) decided at the last meeting are.

Kevin Wagner then proceeded to gain input on what type of representation (various sectors) was needed for the Coordination Committee and gain input on who needed to be involved in the coordination committee. It was decided by the stakeholders that it would be better to break into the workgroups (which was on the agenda) before we decide who needs to be on the Coordination committee.

The stakeholders then broke into two workgroups, Agricultural and Wildlife and Wastewater to begin discussing management measures that would go into the implementation Plan. Allen went with the Wastewater Workgroup and Kevin went with the Agriculture and Wildlife. Below are minutes from each of the workgroups.

In the Wastewater Workgroup, the group began by discussing who else needs to be involved in the workgroup, the best method to get in touch with them, and the best time of day to have workgroup meetings. TCEQ Region 14 is sending TWRI a list of contacts to assist TWRI in recruiting workgroup members. Also, it was determined that during working hours would encourage involvement. In the Agricultural and Wildlife Workgroup, the group began by discussion of who needs to be on the Coordination Committee. An initial list of 13 landowners to contact regarding their interest in participating was developed. The 13 landowners were representative of the 5 counties of the watershed. Further, 3 local wildlife experts and 1 expert to represent coastal fisheries was also identified by the group. The workgroup recommended that the Coordination Committee not be larger than 20 members.

Once the group had identified the list of landowners, wildlife experts, and coastal fisheries representatives, the discussion shifted to the composition of the Agriculture and Wildlife Workgroup. It was agreed that the 13 landowners, 3 wildlife experts, 1 coastal fisheries rep, should form the core of the workgroup along with , county extension agents, NRCS district conservationists, and representatives of all the soil and water conservation districts.

Finally, Kevin Wagner discussed several specific BMPs used for addressing bacteria issues in other watersheds such as Gilliland Creek and the Leon River.
